

Accessible PDF's from InDesign



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The Adobe Acrobat PDF file provides strong support for accessibility. The accessibility of any individual Acrobat PDF file depends upon how well the author has prepared the file, in this course we explore all the tagging and accessibility techniques needed to create a PDF file that validates for use as an accessible content reading file across many readers.

Designing for accessibility

What is accessibility?

Designing for accessibility - using hierarchy, contrasting colours, structuring tables, alternative text for images and graphics

Use paragraph styles consistently throughout your document

Setting up and controlling styles in the document

Establish export tag relationships between InDesign/Word styles and PDF tags

Using the tools/panels in InDesign/Word to set up and name tags

Anchor images within the content flow

Working with text frames to set up image relationships

Add alternative text for images

Using panels to control and input alternative text

Incorporate internal document navigation mechanisms

Setting up links and navigation

Establish content order in the Articles panel

Using the Articles panel to create reading orders in the document

Specify a document title and description as metadata

Adding titles and metadata using panels

Export as PDF with settings optimized for accessibility

Adjusting and controlling PDF settings to ensure the final PDF is accessible according to the adjustments made
